*The Big Short* by Michael Lewis is the story of the people who saw the real estate crash coming and made billions from their foresight. The ethical conundrum at the center of *The Big Short* no doubt will encourage a lively discussion on the meaning of Jewish business ethics and the ease in which others try to scapegoat systemic problems.
